PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Worship services were suspended in from January 16 through Feb 6 due to an increase in COVID. Pastor Rosemary continues to send out weekly bulletins containing the sermon via US mail and email.

We hired Chapman Lawn Services to mow the lawn at the cemetery and they will continue to do so in 2023. We had quite a few repairs that needed to be done this year. The cemetery fence was damaged by a car and has been repaired. The water fountain in the hall outside the office was replaced and the water shut off valve in the furnace room had to be replaced. The biggest expense occurred when we had to replace the HVAC system for the sanctuary. We also removed a tree and a large tree stump in the cemetery as they violated the city code.

At the semi-annual congregational meeting we informed the congregation of the repairs that needed to be done at that time. A second special congregational meeting was held to discuss the replacement of the HVAC system and the congregation voted to spend the funds to do the replacement.

Ginny Ganschinietz presented the financial report. The income was greater than expenses for the year leaving a positive balance in the general account. Each year Illinois South Conference sets a guideline for salary increases for the conference. This year the guideline for salary increases was 5.9% to keep up with the cost of-living increase. Ginny Ganschinietz proposed a budget for 2022 which included this increase for employee's salaries. Wayne Schlosser moved to accept the financial reports from last year and the 2022 budget. Tom Miller seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously. An audit of the books will be completed by Jim Eisenhauer and Sharon Banjavcic.

Eric Moayer was installed by Pastor Rosemary as the new Church Council member.

Pastor Rosemary led the group in saying The Lord's Prayer.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:35.

SEMI ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING MINUTES June 12, 2022

President Sue Williams called the meeting to order at 10:47am.

Sue Williams informed the congregation of the projects that are happening:

Cemetery: The Boy Scouts cleaned up the cemetery and took care of the tree that had fallen down. They also cleaned up the garden area. We have contracted with Chatman's Lawn service to mow the cemetery. The fence was damaged in March and we have contracted with Chesley Fence to make the repairs. This will be paid for by State Farm Insurance who insures the person who hit the fence.

Water Fountain: The old water fountain by the office is broken and we will replace it with a new fountain. The cost is \$493 and Tom Miller will do the installation.

Furnace room: We need to replace the old water shut off valve in the furnace room. The cost will be \$2930 to replace the valve, remove the concrete and patch the concrete.

Pictorial directory: we have been approached by the company that did our last directory about doing a new one. We will need 25 family units to do this at no cost. We can update it without pictures.

Ginny Ganschietz presented the financial report. Ginny stated that while we are not in bad shape right now our expenses have risen due to inflation and are about \$600 more than last year. We have had \$2,800 more in expenses than income.

Nancy Eisenhower asked that we recognize Tom Miller for all of the work he does around the church.

FOOD PANTRY RECAP 2022

St. John UCC did an amazing job of supporting the Fairview Heights Area Food Pantry this year. The congregation donated food items and money each Sunday Communion was served. Evening Circle also made donations.

Over 700 food items graced the altar on their way to the pantry. More than \$3500 was collected during church services. Other members sent donations directly to the pantry and therefore are not listed in this accounting. These funds are used to purchase milk, butter, margarine, eggs, bread, meat, and other items needed that are not met by donations.

The pantry served 983 families (3096 people). There were 86 new families who sought food assistance. The number of Fairview Heights residents in food crisis continues. The pantry also serves emergency orders to non-residents who are referred to the pantry.

Thank you all for helping to meet the needs of others. May our giving spirit continue during 2023.
