The Words of Paul
DESCRIPTION OF FAITH

11 Faith is the reality of what we hope for, the proof of what we don't see. ² The elders in the past were approved because they showed faith.

Acts of faith by God's people

³ By faith we understand that the universe has been created by a word from God so that the visible came into existence from the invisible.

⁸ By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to go out to a place that he was going to receive as an inheritance. He went out without knowing where he was going.

⁹ By faith he lived in the land he had been promised as a stranger. He lived in tents along with Isaac and Jacob, who were coheirs of the same promise. ¹⁰ He was looking forward to a city that has foundations, whose architect and builder is God.

¹¹ By faith even Sarah received the ability to have a child, though she herself was barren and past the age for having children, because she believed that the one who promised was faithful. ¹² So descendants were born from one man (and he was as good as dead). They were as many as the number of the stars in the sky and as countless as the grains of sand on the seashore. ¹³ All these people died in faith without receiving the promises, but they saw the promises from a distance and welcomed them. They confessed that they were strangers and immigrants on earth. ¹⁴ People who say this kind of thing make it clear that they are looking for a

homeland. ¹⁵ If they had been thinking about the country that they had left, they would have had the opportunity to return to it. ¹⁶ But at this point in time, they are longing for a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore, God isn't ashamed to be called their God—he has prepared a city for them.

*GOSPEL LESSON: Luke 12:32-40

³² "Don't be afraid, little flock, because your Father delights in giving you the kingdom. ³³ Sell your possessions and give to those in need. Make for yourselves wallets that don't wear out—a treasure in heaven that never runs out. No thief comes near there, and no moth destroys. ³⁴ Where your treasure is, there your heart will be too.

WARNING ABOUT BEING PREPARED

³⁵ "Be dressed for service and keep your lamps lit. ³⁶ Be like people waiting for their master to come home from a wedding celebration, who can immediately open the door for him when he arrives and knocks on the door. ³⁷ Happy are those servants whom the master finds waiting up when he arrives. I assure you that, when he arrives, he will dress himself to serve, seat them at the table as honored guests, and wait on them. ³⁸ Happy are those whom he finds alert, even if he comes at midnight or just before dawn. ³⁹ But know this, if the homeowner had known what time the thief was coming, he wouldn't

have allowed his home to be broken into. ⁴⁰ You also must be ready, because the Human One is coming at a time when you don't expect him."

MESSAGE: Many Lessons from Few Words

Our Gospel lesson this week continues the message from last week. The rich fool built bigger barns to hold his large harvest. He felt very sure that he would have enough to last himself years of bread. Jesus said, "you fool. You will die tonight. Then who will benefit from your hoarding." The moral of this story is that we should seek first the kingdom of God and not worry about buying more stuff just to fill up our houses.

In part of our scripture today, Jesus asks us to be prepared for the unexpected such as a thief, or a call to meet God. My message on those words of Jesus comes from a preacher who lived from 1907 until 1978. I found his ideas on this scripture very quaint but oh so true. Rev. William Barclay asks us "How would we like God to find us when we are called to meet our God?"

#1 "We would like God to find us with our work completed. Life for so many of us is filled with loose ends. There are things undone and things half done; things put off and things not even attempted. Great men and women have always the sense of a task that must be finished. In John 17:4 Jesus said, 'I glorified you Father on earth by finishing the work that you gave me

to do.' No one should ever lightly leave undone a task that ought to have been finished before night falls.

- 2. "We would like God to find us at peace with one another. It would be a haunting thing to pass from this world in bitterness with a neighbor. We should never let the sun go down on our anger (Ephesians 4:26), least of all the last sun of all and we never know which sun that will be.
- 3. "We would like God to find us at peace with God. It will make all the difference at the last whether we feel that we are going out to a stranger or an enemy or going to fall asleep in the arms of God.

"In the second section of this passage Jesus draws a picture of the wise and the unwise steward. In the middle east the steward had almost unlimited power. He was himself a slave, yet he had control of all the other slaves. A trusted steward ran his master's house for him and administered his estate. The unwise steward made two mistakes. He said I will do what I like while my master is away; he forgot that the day of reckoning must come. We can be like that. We have a habit of dividing life into compartments. There is a part in which we remember that God is present; and there is a part in which we never think of him at all. We tend to draw a line between sacred and secular; but if we really

know what Christianity means we will know that there is no part of life when the master is away. We are working and living forever in our great taskmaster's eye. The second mistake the unwise steward made was saying 'I have plenty of time to put things right before the master comes'; This is another mistake we sometimes make. There is nothing so fatal as to feel that we have plenty of time. Jesus said, "We must work the works of the God who sent me while it is day; night is coming when no one can work' (John 9:4).

"The passage finishes with the warning that knowledge and privilege always bring responsibility. Sin is doubly sinful to those who knew better; failure is doubly blameworthy in those who had every chance to do well."

The moral of these words from Rev. Barclay is that the only plans we should make about the future are to be prepared when we are called to sit next to our Creator in heaven. Amen.
