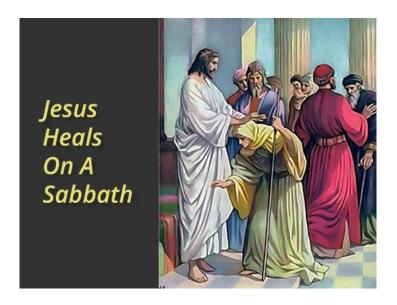

SCRIPTURE LESSON FROM THE FIRST TESTAMENT: Jeremiah 1:4-10 From the Message Demolish, and Then Start Over

1 ¹⁻⁴ The Message of Jeremiah son of Hilkiah of the family of priests who lived in Anathoth in the country of Benjamin. God's Message began to come to him during the thirteenth year that Josiah son of Amon reigned over Judah. It continued to come to him during the time Jehoiakim son of Josiah reigned over Judah. And it continued to come to him clear down to the fifth month of the eleventh year of the reign of Zedekiah son of Josiah over Judah, the year that Jerusalem was taken into exile. This is what God said:

⁵ "Before I shaped you in the womb,

I knew all about you.

Before you saw the light of day,

I had holy plans for you:

A prophet to the nations—

that's what I had in mind for you."

⁶ But I said, "Hold it, Master God! Look at me.

I don't know anything. I'm only a boy!"

7-8 God told me, "Don't say, 'I'm only a boy.'
I'll tell you where to go and you'll go there.
I'll tell you what to say and you'll say it.
Don't be afraid of a soul.
I'll be right there, looking after you."
God's Decree.

⁹⁻¹⁰ God reached out, touched my mouth, and said, "Look! I've just put my words in your mouth—handdelivered!

See what I've done? I've given you a job to do among nations and governments—a red-letter day! Your job is to pull up and tear down, take apart and demolish, And then start over, building and planting."

EPISTLE LESSON: Hebrews 12:18-29 Priestly service in heavenly Jerusalem

¹⁸ You haven't drawn near to something that can be touched: a burning fire, darkness, shadow, a whirlwind, ¹⁹ a blast of a trumpet, and a sound of words that made the ones who heard it beg that there wouldn't be one more word. ²⁰ They couldn't stand the command, *If even a wild animal touches the mountain, it must be stoned.* ²¹ The sight was so frightening that Moses said, "I'm terrified and shaking!"

²² But you have drawn near to Mount Zion, the city of the living God, heavenly Jerusalem, to countless angels in a festival gathering, ²³ to the assembly of God's firstborn

children who are registered in heaven, to God the judge of all, to the spirits of the righteous who have been made perfect, ²⁴ to Jesus the mediator of the new covenant, and to the sprinkled blood that speaks better than Abel's blood. ²⁵ See to it that you don't resist the one who is speaking. If the people didn't escape when they refused to listen to the one who warned them on earth, how will we escape if we reject the one who is warning from heaven? ²⁶ His voice shook the earth then, but now he has made a promise: Still once more I will shake not only the earth but heaven also. ²⁷ The words "still once more" reveal the removal of what is shaken—the things that are part of this creation—so that what isn't shaken will remain. ²⁸ Therefore, since we are receiving a kingdom that can't be shaken, let's continue to express our gratitude. With this gratitude, let's serve in a way that is pleasing to God with respect and awe, ²⁹ because our God really is a consuming fire.

*GOSPEL LESSON Luke 13:10-17 Healing on a Sabbath

¹⁰ Jesus was teaching in one of the synagogues on the Sabbath. ¹¹ A woman was there who had been disabled by a spirit for eighteen years. She was bent over and couldn't stand up straight. ¹² When he saw her, Jesus called her to him and said, "Woman, you are set free from your sickness." ¹³ He placed his hands on her and she straightened up at once and praised God.

¹⁴The synagogue leader, incensed that Jesus had healed on the Sabbath, responded, "There are six days during which work is permitted. Come and be healed on those days, not on the Sabbath day." ¹⁵ The Lord replied, "Hypocrites! Don't each of you on the Sabbath untie your ox or donkey from its stall and lead it out to get a drink? ¹⁶ Then isn't it necessary that this woman, a daughter of Abraham, bound by Satan for eighteen long years, be set free from her bondage on the Sabbath day?" ¹⁷ When he said these things, all his opponents were put to shame, but all those in the crowd rejoiced at all the extraordinary things he was doing.

MESSAGE: "But we've Never Done it That Way"

Let's imagine, for a change, that you are on the edge of the crowd that has followed Jesus so far. You haven't heard everything and haven't understood all you've heard, but you think you've got the general drift of it all and find it both compelling and alarming.

In you go with Jesus to the synagogue o this sabbath. What do you see, and what sense does it make to you? You and everybody else sees the poor woman. She was probably a well-known local character. In a village where everyone's life was public, people would know who she was and how long she'd been like this. The author of the Gospel of Luke says she had "a spirit of weakness," which probably means simply that nobody could explain medically why she had become bent over. No one knows.

In the synagogue you can see an unspoken power struggle going on. There is a synagogue president in charge of the meeting, but all eyes are on Jesus – which puts both of the in an awkward spot in terms of protocol. Jesus, however, doesn't wait. He doesn't need any "protocol." A word, a touch, and the woman is healed. The synagogue president thoroughly upstaged, lets his anger take refuge in

an official public rebuke, rather as if a policeman tried to arrest someone because their football team had just beaten his.

You, as the observer, understand all this. It's bound to be difficult for the local village hierarchy when someone like Jesus comes into town, and when he does extraordinary things in the synagogue it will inevitably cause a fuss. But listen to Jesus' answer. Think about what you've heard on the journey up to this point: the devastating analysis of what was wrong with the area and people of Israel as a whole, the warnings of what lay ahead. Now hear what Jesus has to say, and ponder what it might mean.

"Double standards!" Jesus declares. "You do one thing yourself and yet want to stop me from doing something which is no different, and even more appropriate. This is just play-acting. You are quite happy to untie an animal that needs water; how much more should I untie this woman, a daughter of Abraham, from the grips of satan?" We all know that Jesus knew what was legitimate sabbath practice and what wasn't.

You, as the observer and student, get the point about untying the animal and untying the woman. But what is Jesus saying about this woman? First, she's a daughter of Abraham; second, she has been tied up for 18 years by satan, the one who has Israel as a whole in his grip, the one against whom Jesus has won an initial victory! Suddenly new light dawns. What Jesus is doing for this poor woman is what he is longing to do for Israel as a whole. The enemy, the accuser, has had Israel in his power these many years, and Jesus' kingdom-message is the one thing that can free her. But Israel's insistence on tight boundaries, including

the rigid application of the sabbath law, is preventing it happening. Unless the kingdom-message heals her, there is no hope.

Maybe, you think, Jesus is still hoping that there is time; that Israel, bent over, unable to see anything expect feet, unable to stand upright, will be untied from her bondage in a great sabbath celebration, a great act of liberation. Maybe, you think, Jesus intends that by going to Jerusalem this will all come to pass . . .

And then Jesus tells another story. The kingdom is like a tiny seed producing a huge tree – which can then accommodate all the birds in the sky. One action in one synagogue on ne sabbath; what can this achieve? But when Jesus sows the seed of the kingdom, nobody knows what will result. Or the kingdom as small helping of leaven, hidden apparently in the four. It seems insignificant and ineffectual; but before long the whole mixture is leavened. (Have you ever seen bread dough rise?) One healing of one woman – but every time you break the satanic chains that have tied people up, another victory is won which will go on having repercussions.

Can we compare this story of the seed to church? Unfortunately, the mantra of some churches is "we've never done it that way." The church and the people get stuck doing the same things over and over. They are afraid to make changes because then their particular church building will cease to be THEIR church.

Since I've been here, I'm delighted to say I have ever heard that mantra even once here at St. John. The faithful people of this church are welling to do different things and try different things, all to help the kingdom come to our small congregation. The little bit of leaven that we have is making the Holy Spirit alive and rising. Thanks be to God. Amen.

Write them down. Let yourself see and honor them. These small acts—refusing gossip, picking up trash, returning the extra change, speaking up even when your voice shakes—are sacred. They are the stitching in the fabric of the world. Then ask: *Is there any place in my life where I've gone quiet, where I've compromised?*

Gently, without shame, make a commitment to begin again. You do not need to be perfect. You only need to be aligned.
