#### SCRIPTURE LESSONS: Genesis 15:1-12, 17-18 God's covenant with Abram

15 After these events, the Lord's word came to Abram in a vision, "Don't be afraid, Abram. I am your protector. Your reward will be very great." <sup>2</sup> But Abram said, "Lord God, what can you possibly give me, since I still have no children? The head of my household is Eliezer, a man from Damascus."<sup>[b] 3</sup> He continued, "Since you haven't given me any children, the head of my household will be my heir."

<sup>4</sup> The Lord's word came immediately to him, "This man will not be your heir. Your heir will definitely be your very own biological child." <sup>5</sup> Then he brought Abram outside and said, "Look up at the sky and count the stars if you think you can count them." He continued, "This is how many children you will have." <sup>6</sup> Abram trusted the Lord, and the Lord recognized Abram's high moral character. <sup>7</sup> He said to Abram, "I am the Lord, who brought you out of Ur of the Chaldeans to give you this land as your possession."

<sup>8</sup> But Abram said, "Lord God, how do I know that I will actually possess it?"

<sup>9</sup> He said, "Bring me a three-year-old female calf, a threeyear-old female goat, a three-year-old ram, a dove, and a young pigeon." <sup>10</sup> He took all of these animals, split them in half, and laid the halves facing each other, but he didn't split the birds. <sup>11</sup> When vultures swooped down on the carcasses, Abram waved them off. <sup>12</sup> After the sun set, Abram slept deeply. A terrifying and deep darkness settled over him.

<sup>17</sup> After the sun had set and darkness had deepened, a smoking vessel with a fiery flame passed between the

split-open animals. <sup>18</sup> That day the Lord cut a covenant with Abram: "To your descendants I give this land, from Egypt's river to the great Euphrates,

# Of David.

27 The Lord is my light and my salvation. Should I fear anyone? The Lord is a fortress protecting my life. Should I be frightened of anything?
<sup>2</sup> When evildoers come at me trying to eat me up it's they, my foes and my enemies, who stumble and fall!
<sup>3</sup> If an army camps against me,

my heart won't be afraid.

If war comes up against me,

I will continue to trust in this:

<sup>4</sup> I have asked one thing from the Lord it's all I seek:

to live in the Lord's house all the days of my life, seeing the Lord's beauty and constantly adoring his temple.

I will sing and praise the Lord. <sup>7</sup> Lord, listen to my voice when I cry out have mercy on me and answer me! <sup>8</sup> Come, my heart says, seek God's face.<sup>[a]</sup> Lord, I do seek your face! <sup>9</sup> Please don't hide it from me! Don't push your servant aside angrily you have been my help! God who saves me, don't neglect me! Don't leave me all alone! <sup>10</sup> Even if my father and mother left me all alone, the Lord would take me in. <sup>11</sup>Lord, teach me your way; because of my opponents, lead me on a good path. <sup>12</sup> Don't give me over to the desires of my enemies, because false witnesses and violent accusers have taken their stand against me. <sup>13</sup> But I have sure faith that I will experience the Lord's goodness in the land of the living!

<sup>17</sup> Brothers and sisters, become imitators of me and watch those who live this way—you can use us as models. <sup>18</sup> As I have told you many times and now say with deep sadness, many people live as enemies of the cross. <sup>19</sup> Their lives end with destruction. Their god is their stomach, and they take pride in their disgrace because their thoughts focus on earthly things. <sup>20</sup> Our citizenship is in heaven. We look forward to a savior that comes from there—the Lord Jesus Christ. <sup>21</sup> He will transform our humble bodies so that they are like his glorious body, by the power that also makes him able to subject all things to himself.

# \*GOSPEL LESSON: Luke 13:31-35

**Sorrow for Jerusalem**<sup>31</sup> At that time, some Pharisees approached Jesus and said, "Go! Get away from here, because Herod wants to kill you."

<sup>32</sup> Jesus said to them, "Go, tell that fox, 'Look, I'm throwing out demons and healing people today and tomorrow, and on the third day I will complete my work. <sup>33</sup> However, it's necessary for me to travel today, tomorrow, and the next day because it's impossible for a prophet to be killed outside of Jerusalem.'

<sup>34</sup> "Jerusalem, Jerusalem, you who kill the prophets and stone those who were sent to you! How often I have wanted to gather your people just as a hen gathers her chicks under her wings. But you didn't want that. <sup>35</sup> Look, your house is abandoned. I tell you, you won't see me until the time comes when you say, *Blessings on the one who comes in the Lord's name.*"

These are the ancient words revealed to us anew. Thanks be to God.

#### **MESSAGE:**

The readings for this, the Second Sunday in Lent, stresses promise and expectation – promise and expectation. In the First Testament reading we heard the account of the covenant with Abraham in Genesis 15 which contains God's promise of a child to the childless, and Abraham responds with faithful trust in the God who makes the promise. The Psalm is filled with assurance and confident trust in God. The Epistolary reading calls attention to the cross and reminds the church that it awaits its savior. The words of Jesus to Herod in our text spark anticipation of the events commemorated during Holy Week. Promise and expectation. Our theme this morning.

Another reason that our reading of Luke 13:31-35 is especially appropriate for the Lenten season is because it looks toward Jerusalem and the passion of Jesus. In Luke 9:51 we will read "he set his face to go to Jerusalem." If Lent is understood as a pilgrimage to Good Friday and Easter, this passage is definitely appropriate for it comes within Luke's lengthy "journey narrative." The image of Jesus that we can imagine is of a man going through one town and village after another as he made his way to Jerusalem.

When the Pharisees approach Jesus to warn him of the dangers ahead, Jesus almost sounds favorable to them. But if Jesus had anything nice to say to them, we didn't hear it. Herod Antipas, was the son of Herod the great, known as a bully and a butcher. The present Herod had beheaded John the Baptist and now was probably planning on treating Jesus the same way.

Were you surprised when you heard how Jesus answered the Pharisees? I always pictured Jesus as mild mannered, yet his response sounded a little heated. Plus do you think it was a good idea for Jesus to tell Herod where he was going to be the next couple of days? But even so, the author of the gospel of Luke wants us to understand that both friends (some Pharisees) and foes (Herod) could not alter Jesus' sure obedience to the will of God.

As the Lenten season begins, we can look forward to reading more about Jesus' journey to the great city of Jerusalem where the prophets are killed. Plus we should be alert as to how many times Jesus walks away from danger and continues to obey the will of God. Jesus showed courage not often seen today. Amen.
