SUMMARY OF SCRIPTURE TEXTS

Habakkuk 1:1-4; 2:1-4 In the opening words of this text, we hear echoes of our own protest to God against injustice in the world, while in the closing words we are reassured that the righteous will live by faith.

Psalm 119:137-144 The theme of righteousness also pervades this Psalm, although the emphasis falls on the righteousness of God. These words serve well as a response to the reading from Habakkuk, for they boldly assert and defend God's justice.

2 Thessalonians 1:1-4, 11-12 The apostle Paul's opening prayer of thanksgiving concluding with the confident hope that God would make new converts worthy of their calling.

Luke 19:1-10 We meet the familiar story of Zacchaeus, whose encounter with the Lord results in his conversion and uncommon generosity.

SCRIPTURE LESSONS: Old Testament Habakkuk 1:1-4; 2:1-4 From "THE MESSAGE" Justice Is a Joke

1 1-4 The problem as God gave Habakkuk to see it:
God, how long do I have to cry out for help before you listen? How many times do I have to yell, "Help!
Murder! Police!" before you come to the rescue?
Why do you force me to look at evil, stare trouble in the face day after day? Anarchy and violence break out, quarrels and fights all over the place.
Law and order fall to pieces. Justice is a joke.
The wicked have the righteous hamstrung and stand justice on its head.

2 What's God going to say to my questions? I'm braced for the worst. I'll climb to the lookout tower and scan the horizon. I'll wait to see what God says, how he'll answer my complaint.

*GOSPEL LESSON: Luke 19:1-10

A rich tax collector

19 Jesus entered Jericho and was passing through town. ² A man there named Zacchaeus, a ruler among tax collectors, was rich. ³ He was trying to see who Jesus was, but, being a short man, he couldn't because of the crowd. ⁴ So he ran ahead and climbed up a sycamore tree so he could see Jesus, who was about to pass that way. ⁵ When Jesus came to that spot, he looked up and said, "Zacchaeus, come down at once. I must stay in your home today." ⁶ So Zacchaeus came down at once, happy to welcome Jesus.

⁷ Everyone who saw this grumbled, saying, "He has gone to be the guest of a sinner."

⁸ Zacchaeus stopped and said to the Lord, "Look, Lord, I give half of my possessions to the poor. And if I have cheated anyone, I repay them four times as much."

⁹ Jesus said to him, "Today, salvation has come to this household because he too is a son of Abraham. ¹⁰ The Human One came to seek and save the lost."

These are the ancient words revealed to us anew.

MESSAGE: "The Man Everyone Despised"

This episode of Luke 19:1-10 is what they call, a Human Interest story. If you have ever written for a newspaper or magazine you've heard that term. We can also see Human interest stories on shows such as the Today Show or other morning news programs that broadcast all types of information. I think it helps to have Human Interest stories when we the audience get bored and overwhelmed with the news from Washington.

The author of the Gospel of Luke is well known for his parables that have a narrative plot and include more than the usual amount of interesting detail: such as the good Samaritan that Nancy preached on a while back. Then there was the rich fool who built bigger barns to hoard all his grain and then who died that same night. We had the story of the rich man and Lazarus, and which one suffered in the after-life. There was the dishonest steward, the unjust judge from two weeks ago, the Pharisee and the tax collector who prayed differently, and we can't forget the story of the Prodigal son.

It is also the case that Luke's writings bring us literary artistry in narrating non-parable stories. You know sometimes we forget that the Bible is a work of literature. As a matter of fact, I think Southwestern Illinois College still offers the class "the Bible as Literature". I took both semesters many years ago. It was very enjoyable to look at the Bible in a different way.

The story before us today is a also a conflict story. "All who saw it began to grumble and said, 'He has gone to be the guest of one who is a sinner." In that day as well as today, the common wisdom was "birds of a feather flock together" and "you can judge a person by the company he keeps." Don't we warn our teenage children to stay away from certain crowds of kids. My parents used to tease my brother and I every week; "well we didn't see your name in the police blotter in the newspaper this week so we guess you're listening to our warnings."

I'm sure you can think of a few churches who don't want "sinners" in their church. My response is, "where would you like them to go for help?"

That Jesus rejected such "wisdom" in his seeking and searching to teach how to love is a vivid and repeated truth of the Gospels. One thing he taught us was that loving and forgiving are not condoning, and the behavior of Jesus fulfills rather than abolishes righteousness. Let me say that again. Loving and forgiving is not the same as condoning, or excusing, or ignoring, or overlooking. I believe some of us are afraid to forgive someone because that person may think that what they did or didn't do was okay. Forgiving is not pardoning the offense.

This story about Zacchaeus is a radical one. Zacchaeus is not only a tax collector but a chief tax collector. All the criticism that could be hurled against a tax collector such as ceremonially unclean for he was Jewish, socially ostracized, politically treasonous, could be compounded against Zacchaeus. In a corrupt system, the loftier the position the greater the involvement in that corruption.

Some people might say, "well maybe he is nice at home." Probably not. The fact is, a person is not privately righteous while participating in a corrupt system that robs and crushes other persons.

Zacchaeus was not hiding a private righteous life. He was crooked through and through. That's what makes this story so radical.

Zacchaeus was silently granted grace by Jesus.
WHAT?? Everyone thought he was beyond forgiveness or repentance. Haven't we all thought that about some people? "They are beyond help. They will never change. They will never give up all their riches and lavish life style!"

I know this is hard for us to believe, but Jesus does not give up on anyone. We may think it is unfair for people like Zacchaeus to be given grace, but that is not ours to decide. We are not judges. That job is taken by the Almighty.

This man, Zacchaeus, without Jesus lecturing to him, repented and voluntarily gave restitution to all those he had cheated. <u>Did you notice that?</u> Jesus did not shake

his finger at Zacchaeus. He did not say "shame on you, Zacchaeus." All Jesus did was invite himself to the tax collector's home. And the tax collector confessed to everyone around that tree that day, that he would give half of his possessions to the poor and that he would repay four times over anyone he had cheated.

Why did Jesus have that affect on Zacchaeus? We don't exactly know, but we know it happened. And what was Jesus's response to all those people who despised Zacchaeus? Jesus said, "Today, salvation has come to this house-hold because he too is a son of Abraham" as we all are. Jesus said, "The Human One came to seek and save the lost."
