²⁷⁻²⁸ "Be ready. The time's coming"—God's Decree— "when I will plant people and animals in Israel and Judah, just as a farmer plants seed. And in the same way that earlier I relentlessly pulled up and tore down, took apart and demolished, so now I am sticking with them as they start over, building and planting. ²⁹ "When that time comes you won't hear the old proverb anymore. Parents ate the green apples, their children got the stomachache. 30 "No, each person will pay for his own sin. You eat green apples, you're the one who gets sick.

Be ready to do it whether it is convenient or inconvenient. Correct, confront, and encourage with patience and instruction. ³ There will come a time when people will not tolerate sound teaching. They will collect teachers who say what they want to hear because they are self-centered. ⁴They will turn their back on the truth and turn to myths. 5 But you

must keep control of yourself in all circumstances. Endure suffering, do the work of a preacher of the good news, and carry out your service fully.

*GOSPEL LESSON: Luke 18:1-8 Justice for the faithful

18 Jesus was telling them a parable about their need to pray continuously and not to be discouraged. ² He said, "In a certain city there was a judge who neither feared God nor respected people. ³ In that city there was a widow who kept coming to him, asking, 'Give me justice in this case against my adversary.' 4 For a while he refused but finally said to himself, I don't fear God or respect people, ⁵ but I will give this widow justice because she keeps bothering me. Otherwise, there will be no end to her coming here and embarrassing me." ⁶ The Lord said, "Listen to what the unjust judge says. ⁷ Won't God provide justice to his chosen people who cry out to him day and night? Will he be slow to help them? 8 I tell you, he will give them justice quickly. But when the Human One comes, will he find faithfulness on earth?"

MESSAGE: "What are you praying for?"

As members of the animal species, humans are the most curious. We have questions about everything. Even as toddlers we ask our parents "why?" over and over. Why

do I have to eat my vegetables? Why isn't Christmas tomorrow?

Today's lesson is all about questions. In Luke 17:20-37, which we did not read, contains a big question from the Pharisees to Jesus. "When is this kingdom of God coming?" This question from the Pharisees seems to imply that Jesus has a timetable in mind, in which certain things would happen in a particular order so that one could tick them off and get ready for the final drama. Jesus answers the Pharisees that it won't be like that. Life will go on as normal until the last moment; but there is something else to be said as well. God's kingdom, Jesus says, is within your grasp.

The phrase Jesus uses in verse 21 of Luke 17 is "God's kingdom isn't the sort of thing you can watch for and see coming. People won't say 'Look, here it is,' or 'Look, over there!' No: God's kingdom is within your grasp."

According to scholar Rev. N.T. Wright, that phrase has sometimes been translated "within you," and people have often thought it meant that the kingdom is purely spiritual, a private, interior relationship with God. But Jesus never used "God's kingdom" in that sense. God's kingdom always refers to things that happen in the public world, not to private experience. Others have suggested that the phrase "within you" means "in our midst"; God's kingdom, in other words, is present but

secret, hidden, waiting for us to discover it. That's closer, but still not quite there.

The phrase is more active. It doesn't just tell you where the kingdom is; it tells you that you've got to do something about it. It is "within your grasp"; it is confronting you with a decision, the decision to believe, trust and follow Jesus. It isn't the sort of thing that's just going to happen, so that you can sit back and watch. God's sovereign plan to put the world right is waiting for you to sign on. Rev. Wright says, "That is the force of what Jesus is saying." This "kingdom" will be sudden and destructive.

The passage holds out an invitation, to this day, to those who are anxious about the future: God's sovereign rule of the world, God's healing love, are not only ours for the grasping, but are waiting for your help.

Whew! That's all about the passage we did not read, but I thought it was important to mention these important words to put everything in the correct context. I think we have been looking in the wrong place to understand this passage. So, what does everything I just said have to do with a persistent widow and prayer? I promise to put it together. Honest. There's more to this parable than you think. Remember the Pharisees asked Jesus when God's kingdom is coming. This includes what is called the Parousia; the second coming of Jesus; some call it the end of the world. The parable Jesus tells in

Luke 18 is about a persistent widow who needed vindication from her enemy. After nagging the judge for quite a while, the judge agrees to hear her case. The bottom line of this parable is if an insensitive and hardened judge will hear the pleas of a widow, how much more can we trust that God will hear the prayers of those who day and night cry for VINDICATION.

At first glance it seems that Jesus is teaching the disciples that they ought always to pray and not lose heart as a valid and important lesson in constancy, BUT the point in our text concerns NOT PRAYER IN GENERAL BUT A SPECIFIC PRAYER. We should not be praying for a Rolls Royce. Discerning the specific problem being addressed demands that we look at the context and at the interpretive comments at the conclusion of the parable. The context for today's lection begins with the question concerning when the kingdom of God is to come. The parable of the unjust Judge is to be interpreted in that context; the coming of the Son of Man.

With this understanding, verse 1 should be interpreted as a word to the disciples who have been taught to pray "thy kingdom come," but who now have grown weary and are losing heart. Their discouragement is probably due in part to the passing of time and to what is usually referred to as the delay of the Parousia, Jesus's second coming. You may recall that Paul thought

the Parousia was coming soon and in his lifetime. But, of course, we're still waiting. We're all waiting for <u>vindication</u>, justice. When will it happen?

Actually, curious human creatures, that is the <u>wrong</u> <u>question to ask.</u> The question, how long shall we continue to pray? is doubly answered in the parable and the comments that follow. But the really crucial question is the one asked by Jesus. The Son of Man is coming to vindicate his people, BUT WHO ARE HIS PEOPLE? Will those apparently so interested in the end of times and the reversal of the fortunes of the evil and the good be faithfully committed to Christ up until the end? Will the Son of Man actually find faith among us? As stated by Christ elsewhere, "The one who endures to the end will be saved."
