SCRIPTURE LESSONS: Jeremiah 4:11-12, 22-28

¹¹⁻¹² At that time, this people, yes, this very Jerusalem, will be told in plain words:

"The northern hordes are sweeping in from the desert steppes—

A wind that's up to no good, a gale-force wind. I ordered this wind.

I'm pronouncing my hurricane judgment on my people."

²² "What fools my people are! They have no idea who I am.

A company of half-wits, dopes and donkeys all!

Experts at evil

but klutzes at good."

²³⁻²⁶ I looked at the earth—

it was back to pre-Genesis chaos and emptiness.

I looked at the skies,

EPISTLE: 1 Timothy 1:12-17 The words of Paul Thanksgiving

¹² I thank Christ Jesus our Lord, who has given me strength because he considered me faithful. So he appointed me to ministry ¹³ even though I used to speak against him, attack his people, and I was proud. But I was shown mercy because I acted in ignorance and without faith. ¹⁴ Our Lord's favor poured all over me along with the faithfulness and love that are in Christ Jesus. 15 This saying is reliable and deserves full acceptance: "Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners"—and I'm the biggest sinner of all. ¹⁶ But this is why I was shown mercy, so that Christ Jesus could show his endless patience to me first of all. So I'm an example for those who are going to believe in him for eternal life. ¹⁷ Now to the king of the ages, to the immortal, invisible, and only God, may honor and glory be given to him forever and always! Amen.

*GOSPEL LESSON: Luke 15:1-10 Occasions for celebration

15 All the tax collectors and sinners were gathering around Jesus to listen to him. ² The Pharisees and legal experts were grumbling, saying, "This man welcomes sinners and eats with them."

³ Jesus told them this parable: ⁴ "Suppose someone among you had one hundred sheep and lost one of them. Wouldn't he leave the other ninety-nine in the pasture and search for the lost one until he finds it? ⁵ And when he finds it, he is thrilled and places it on his shoulders. ⁶ When he arrives home, he calls together his friends and neighbors, saying to them, 'Celebrate with me because I've found my lost sheep.' ⁷ In the same way, I tell you, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who changes both heart and life than over ninetynine righteous people who have no need to change their hearts and lives.

⁸ "Or what woman, if she owns ten silver coins and loses one of them, won't light a lamp and sweep the house, searching her home carefully until she finds it? ⁹ When she finds it, she calls together her friends and neighbors, saying, 'Celebrate with me because I've found my lost coin.' ¹⁰ In the same way, I tell you, joy breaks out in the presence of God's angels over one sinner who changes both heart and life."

MESSAGE: "Why Did Jesus Tell These Two Parables?

Jesus is at dinner again and, as usual, the Pharisees are stalking him. I guess they are making lists of actions and words that Jesus does and says that are hypocritical or not in the Jewish laws. The Pharisees know all the laws and rules so its easy for them to point fingers.

At this dinner the Pharisees see men and women who, by the orthodox, were labelled as sinners. The Pharisees gave to people who did not keep the law a general classification. According to scholars, those sinners were called *the People of the Land*. There was a complete barrier between the Pharisees and the People of the Land.

The Pharisaic regulations laid it down. "When a man is one of the People of the Land, entrust no money to him, take no testimony from him, trust him with no secret, do not appoint him guardian of an orphan, do not make him the custodian of charitable funds, do not accompany him on a journey." A Pharisee was forbidden to be the guest of any such man or to have him as his guest. He was even forbidden, so far as it was possible, to have any business dealings with him. It was the deliberate Pharisaic aim to avoid every contact with the people who did no observe the petty details of the law; such as, do not put cheese on your sandwich that has meat on it.

Obviously, they would be shocked to the ore at the way in which Jesus kept company with people who were not only rank outsiders but sinners, contact with whom would necessarily defile. It's as if all the People of the Land had leprosy. To the Pharisees, sinning was contagious and incurable. We will understand these parables more fully if we remember that the strict Jews said, not "There will be joy in heaven over one sinner who repents," but "There will be joy in heaven over one sinner who is obliterated before God." They looked forward not to the saving but to the destruction of the sinner. Once people were labeled as sinners, there was no way to change their lot in life, even if they repented.

As we can see, Jesus looked at the People of the Land differently. In applications of both of the parables that Jesus told, the difference between the value system of Jesus challengers and that of "heaven" which Jesus represents.

The Pharisees have put people in boxes, or specific pigeon cubes for the rest of their lives. According to the Pharisees, there is no repentance that can change the status of these people. The Pharisees are prejudiced and racist. Do we do that? At first glance of some people, do we immediately judge that person and label that person as someone you will stay away from. "Those people" have no value in our society. The coin that was found had value, as did the sheep that was found. But sinners?

What value do sinners have? Jesus answers, plenty. Every person has value. We are all created by God. We are all brothers and sisters and we ALL deserve as many chances as necessary to find God, follow Jesus, and repent our sins. That's the Good News of the Gospel. Amen.
