ONE LAST WORKDAY! (THIS TIME I MEAN IT, I THINK)

The good news – all the feminine hygiene kits for Peru are done! All we have to do is to put labels on them and pack them for transport. If you can help, come to church on **Tuesday, March 5, at 10:00 a.m. The Peru Project will be dedicated to God during worship March 31.**

More good news!

We have a lot of plastic bags for homeless mats. There are three different jobs that need to be done.

1. The bags need to be folded and cut into strips. Those cutting the plastic will need scissors.

2. The strips need to be joined into a continuous piece of plastic for crocheting. You don't have to be able to crochet to help with this project.

3. We will have someone (Chris, who helped with the Peru Project) who will teach us how to crochet with the plastic. You will need a crochet hook, size

N. I used a coupon and got one very cheaply at Joann's. Below are the instructions, for reference.

With two groups working, our hope is that we can work until about noon and be done with the packing and have a good beginning on the crochet project. See you on the 5th!!

We promised another project – a little painting work on our wall sculpture for the fellowship hall. We are postponing that until later.

Instructions for making the mats can be found on Youtube and many websites. <u>Here is a simple pattern</u>:

1. Flatten the plastic bag and straighten any of the bags creases. Keep folding bag vertically (from left edge to right edge) until the fold is approx. 1 inch wide.

2. Cut off the top handles and the bottom seam. (Put unused scraps in a bag to recycle at grocery store drop-off).

3. From top to bottom of folded bag, cut 1 1/2 inch strips across vertically (left to right). Each strip should be a loop when opened up. (If any strip has an opened end, tie a very small knot to make it a loop).

4. Hook the loops together with a basic "larks head knot". This is done by overlapping two of the loops end-to-end, then pulling the top of one end through the middle intersection of the two loops. Repeat this step.

5. Roll the looped strips into a ball of plarn.

6. Using size N crochet hook, crochet 60 chain stitches (approx. 3 fit wide). Continue to crochet rows of single crochet stitch until the sleeping mat is

approximately 6 feet long and 3 feet wide.

7. Crochet a chain stitch of plarn long enough to attach to one end and tie up the rolled mat. This serves as a carrying handle.

WEDNESDAY EVENING LENTEN STUDY

For 5 Wednesday evenings, beginning on March 13, we will begin a study based on the book "Making Sense of the Cross" written by Rev. David Lose.

To quote Dr. Lose from the introduction, "A Unique Approach – this book has been written as a complete narrative. After introducing the question of why the cross matters so much to Christians in the first chapter, we consider the primary narratives of Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection contained in the four New Testament Gospels.

In Chapters 3 and through 5, we look at three primary approaches, or theories of atonement, used to make sense of the cross during the twothousand-year history of the Christian tradition. In each case, we will honestly gauge both the strengths and weaknesses of the approach in question as well as compare and contrast them with each other.

In the sixth and final chapter, I offer a slightly different way of approaching the question that I hope you will find meaningful. While the book proceeds as a complete narrative, however, I have found that many people profit from reading this kind of material in a group where they can discuss it with others."

Our study will begin at 6:30 pm and end at 8:00 pm each Wednesday. A light supper will be served at 6:00 pm for those who would like to eat before the study.

There will be copies of the book available to borrow or buy (\$10). We have a DVD to guide us. I hope you will attend as often as you can. Pastor R.
