Mission Moment about the Justice 100 Campaign

Jesus advocated for the outcasts, those unloved and those alone. **God** sees into our hearts and souls and **God** calls us to be servants to the whole human family. The **UCC** has always been conscience of witnessing and seeking justice for those

who find themselves unloved, alone or cast out. Individuals in the LGBTQ+ community can fall into this category. They face acts of hatred and violence. Now, trans youth face targeted legislation, healthcare access is under threat, and the fight for full inclusion continues. Some people in today's world are repelled by associating with these beloved people whom Jesus would have welcomed.

More than ten years ago, our congregation chose to be part of the **Open and Affirming Coalition**, by declaring ourselves an **Open and Affirming congregation**. Since all UCC churches are not Open and Affirming Congregations the Coalition receives no funding from the United Church of Christ itself. The Coalition to which **we belong**, is a separate not-for-profit organization having to raise its own funds. The Justice 100 Campaign supports **this organization**. Our "Pennies for Mission" in October was for the Justice 100 Campaign, and we collected \$124.65.

The Justice 100 Campaign is ambitious. It hopes to raise \$100,000 this Fall. As the flyer in our October Newsletter explains, with these funds, the Open and Affirming Coalition, can expand the movement, strengthen networking, build bridges for change, empower advocates, create circles of support and foster safe and affirming spaces for the LGBTQ+ communities. It dreams for the day when 100% of UCC congregations will be Open and Affirming.

St. John UCC belongs to the coalition. We have our flag on the front of the building declaring "Justice for All." How else have we supported this movement? I am not sure if we have ever **financially** supported the Open and Affirming coalition to which we belong.

Could our small congregation possibly raise \$1000 for this movement by the end of the year? I am sure whatever we donate will be appreciated. If you feel you can make an extra contribution for the cause, put it in an envelope marked "Justice 100 Campaign."

FOOD PANTRY SUGGESTIONS

Most people buy what they think food pantry users want, but have never asked them. If you help families, single people, foster youth and the homeless, this list can help better tailor your donations! Some tips and guidance if you donate to food pantries derived from feedback by those who use them:
