WHY WAS JESUS BAPTIZED IN THE JORDON RIVER?

As a Catholic youth, I knew Jesus was the Son of God, so when this Sunday's gospel came around I assumed God prompted John to offer baptism, and prompted Jesus to ask John for it, so God could say "You are my beloved Son," so the evangelists could record that, so we'd all believe it. Pretty tidy logic, right?

Well now I'm a Catholic senior citizen, very senior. I've come to believe that **God laughs at our need for tidiness.** Rather, God takes advantage of historical events, prompting prophets to make surprising interpretations of them, prompting us to question what's going on and how it all works together. Questions are okay, if only because we honor God by using our God-given brains. And we honor our community by sharing our questions honestly.

I first assumed that the Old Testament was about Jews having a Gentile problem, and the New Testament was about Christians having a Jewish problem. But there's a subtext in the New Testament, a problem that had to be described discreetly. It was that **both Jews and Christians had a Roman problem.**

The Judea where John the Baptist and Jesus grew up had become a province of Rome. Rome was the Empire of militaristic suppression, of arrogant swagger, of callous enslavement, of frat-boy debauchery, of utter contempt for "barbarians" on their borders. Rome had learned to be slightly tolerant of the native civilizations of some of their provincials, but they were always letting them know who was boss. The most convincing display of Rome's might was the crucifixion, and they held the right to impose it exclusively.

But in Judea, the occupiers **went too far when they built Roman-style bathhouses around the Jerusalem Temple.** Talk about insulting all that is holy! John was the son of a Temple priest. He could not abide this sacrilege. His response was to offer an alternative to the obnoxious Roman baths. It wasn't in the city but in the Jordan River, the original – and highly symbolic – border of the Promised Land. Many, many Judeans followed him to the Jordan and bathed there, cleansing themselves of Roman imperial filth and decay, of humiliation and grief. Jesus of Nazareth joined John in conducting the ritual elements of this bath. And he succeeded John, inheriting some of John's disciples when the Bather was executed.

And Our Baptisms?

To the extent that this is an accurate picture of the origins of Christian baptism, it offers an alternative energy and direction to the routine renewal of our baptismal commitments. Even if all you do is "bless yourself with holy water" at the entrance of church, it's a reminder to declare you want to be cleansed of imperialistic filth and decay, cleansed of the desire to dominate others, free of the urge to dehumanize them, loosed from the bonds of guilt, whatever the source. Saint Paul took this imagery even further: Baptized into Christ, he says, you died and **were buried** (immersed) with Christ and **have been raised** with him to a new life.

DUBOIS QUILT

This year's DuBois raffle quilt will be at St. John on February 9. St. John UCC Mascoutah makes a children's quilt every year. They make a circuit to selected UCC churches in the area to sell chances on the quilt. The Mascoutah church then matches whatever the quilt takes in on the raffle. All proceeds go to Camp DuBois.
